History House 1943 Coast Artillery Christmas Celebration Ft. Hancock, New Jersey

On 15-16 December 2018, the National Park Service (NPS), supported by the Sandy Hook Foundation (http://sandyhookfoundation.com/) and Army Ground Forces Association (AGFA) presented a 1943 Christmas Celebration at "History House" located at Fort Hancock's Historic Post, part of the Sandy Hook Unit of Gateway National Recreation Area, which is located within the Fort Hancock Sandy Hook Proving Ground National Historic Landmark District (the entire Sandy Hook Peninsula).

The educational objective was to provide an interpretation of the Harbor Defense soldiers of Fort Hancock as they would have celebrated Christmas in 1943.

The photo below shows the participating membership and guests on Sunday, 16 December in the parlor room of History House. The home was built in 1897, and completed just in time for the outbreak of the Spanish American War in 1898. Designated originally as a "Lieutenant's House" per Army standards, the home is 4,500 square feet and was intended for one junior officer and family. History House is known formally as "Quarters 1," and is one of 18 homes which comprise "Officers Row," one of the most visually appealing features of Fort Hancock's Historic Post.
